Mass Shootings in CA, TX and OH!

On July 28th, as the 41st annual Gilroy Garlic Festival was winding down, a 19-year- old assailant circumvented security by cutting a hole in a wire fence and smuggled in an "AK47 Style Assault Rifle." He then



began firing randomly at innocent people. Fortunately, there was a large police presence at the festival and 3 officers engaged and killed the shooter with their handguns.

News reports indicate the shooter legally purchased the rifle in Nevada before transporting it (illegally) to California. As you may know California has some of the strictest gun laws in the country, however, none of them were able to prevent this

shooting. You can ban the guns, you can put up metal detectors, you can flood the venue with law enforcement, and still a determined criminal killed 3 and wounded 12 innocent unarmed people.

El Paso, Texas

On Saturday, August 3rd a deranged individual drove over 600 miles to El Paso, and according to Police, pulled into Wal Mart because he was "hungry" and to "case" the store. He then went back to his car, put on eye and ear protection grabbed his gun and began walking back to the store and started shooting. First reponders began arriving on the scene within 6 minutes of the 911 call. According to reports, "The shooter was taken into custody without incident. The El Paso police chief reported no shots were fired by the officers on scene. It was later reported that the shooter was discovered sitting in his vehicle watching police respond, before leaving his vehicle and walking over to police vehicles and arrested."

Dayton, Ohio

Less than 24 hours later, shots rang out in historic Oregon District of Dayton, OH. The shooter apparently drove to the area with his sister and a friend before they separated. He later reportedly returned to his car to get his gun, additional ammunition/magazines, body armor, mask and hearing protection before opening fire on the street. Police immediately began running towards the gunfire and engaged the suspect just before he attempted to gain access into one of the buildings. The entire incident was over in less than 60 seconds. In the aftermath, 9 people died including the suspects sister.

At what point do we realize that no law is going to stop a mass shooting? How many times do we have to watch these events unfold to realize a "gun free zone" only increases your chance of being killed? How about we start holding government agencies like the City of Virginia Beach and others that strip us of our 2nd Amendment rights accountable when they are unable to protect us. It is time we speak up and remind our bureaucrats and politicians that "the right to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed!"

The truth is, every-time a mass shooting occurs the anti -gun crowd stands up and shout that we need more "common sense gun laws." They lobby, call, email legislators and protest for universal background checks, magazine restrictions, increased age limits, red flag laws, etc, while we, the pro gun crowd, sit silently in the corner.

As we approach the 2020 election we need to make sure our voices are heard loud and clear at the ballot box. When Government Agencies or Company Policies insist on disarming us at our places of employment, we should ask the hard questions: Will you provide Armed Security? Will you take responsibility if a disgruntled employee turns into an active shooter? I certainly am not encouraging anyone to break the law or go against company policy, but what if Kate Nixon of Virginia Beach had brought her gun into work that day. She and 11 others might still be alive. Imagine if you will, a scenario in El Paso, where as soon as the gunman entered through those sliding glass doors he was immediately engaged by 2-3 CCW holders.

The only way these mass shootings are going to stop is when these potential killers start seeing news story after news story report headlines like "Potential Mass Shooter Thwarted by Prepared Citizens."



When the Student Becomes the Teacher

This past weekend I wrapped up a USCCA Instructor Course. As usual, the course was evenly split between



male and female instructor candidates. The class reminded me about a recent story I saw with our friend and fellow USSCA Training Counselor Beth Alcazar. Like Beth, many of the Female Instructors that have come through our classes didn't start off with the intentions of becoming an instructor. Most hesitantly signed up for their first class because of a traumatic experience, societal concerns or a nagging spouse or family member, and they were probably expecting to find a bunch of loud and obnoxious military and law enforcement guys screaming and barking orders at them on the range. What most of them found is that the majority of the gun community, particularly those in the civilian self- defense arena, are everyday people looking to help others by passing on their knowledge on how to be better prepared to defend themselves and their families.

Encouraged by the experience in their first class, these ladies soon followed up with additional intermediate and advanced classes, shooting matches or other classes like Hand to Hand Combatives or Medical and First Aid courses. With this new found knowledge, they in turn start helping friends and family members and quickly realize, they learn even more by helping others. The empowerment they feel from their new found knowledge and skills and the satisfaction they get from helping others convinces them to try the next step to see if they can actually become a firearms instructor. They are again filled with anxiety that they won't have the firearms knowledge, skills or background to pass the course, unaware that good instructors don't have to know "everything about guns" or be a top shot contender at a shooting match. The best instructors are those that are passionate about helping others, and have the ability to effectively pass that knowledge on to others.

Today, women are the fastest growing sector of the concealed carry market and there are simply not enough female instructors to keep pace. We definitively need more female students to become teachers!

"Skill Chunking"

In last month's Training Tip section we talked about the difference between mental training and reality based training, and how my last force on force training session helped me "chunk" my



mental training and Active Shooter Training together.

Coincidentally, our friend Dave Spaulding addresses this in his latest article called Three A's Of Defensive Pistolcraft in American Rifleman. In it Dave states,

"A true skill is a physical action that can be performed on the first try with a high expectation of success, regardless of the conditions faced. In addition, it is quite likely that a single skill will not win the day; rather, a series of skills will need to be "chunked" together seamlessly, in one fluid motion, without hesitation. Many have lost their fights due to their inability to merge skills."

In this First Person Defender video, Boondocks FTA[™] instructor John Roberts is merely taking out the trash when things start to unravel.

In the first part of the scenario, John finds two men in the alley. One man is laying

on the ground bleeding, while another is crouching over the injured person. As John attempts to back out and avoid the situation, the second man begins to rapidly approach him with his hand in his pocket. As John moves rearward, he draws his firearm, but does not shoot. The situation ends with no shots fired.

In the second and much more difficult scenario, John rounds the corner to see two men talking. From the angle, John can't tell that one of the men is armed. His instincts tell him it is best to avoid the situation, but as he turns to leave he is confronted by the lookout that pulls a gun on him. John is able to swat the bad guys' gun away while simultaneously drawing his own gun. John fires a single shot before what appears to be close quarter contact causes the gun to have a Type 3 or Double Feed malfunction. As Dave states in his article, "*There is no way to know how a close-quarter pistol fight will unfold.*"

In the classroom, the tactic for dealing with a double feed is to seek cover and then clear the malfunction. Having trained with John, I have seen him clear many type 3 malfunctions, and I have heard him re-iterate to students the importance of seeking cover. However, the ability "chunk" these skills (Clearing Type 3 Malfunctions & Seeking Cover) together rarely present themselves in a training environment.

Having taken several of Dave's classes in the past, I have heard him on numerous occasions stress the importance of force on force training. He has also stated that despite spending millions of dollars to train our military service members, they are routinely killed by people with far less training. John has had over 37 years of Active and Reserve duty in the US Special Forces (click here to read his full bio), and he will be the first to tell you that avoidance is key to staying safe.

In the military, special forces units spend months preparing for a mission and often build replica structures and run the scenarios hundreds of times before go time. As civilians, we don't have that luxury and if we are able to avoid a potentially dangerous situation, we should.

Dave Spaudling will be returning to Boondocks FTA[™] in October with his Advanced Covert Pistol with Low Light Segment Class. and again in February 2020 for his Kinetic Combat Pistol Course.

If you would like to get in on some force on force training, check out our Defensive Carry or Defensive Pistol II class that includes a night shoot and a full day of scenario and force on force training.

G43x and G48 now in Black!

Earlier this year, Glock introduced the G43X and G48. Both are slim 10+1 capacity compact carry guns. Both of the initial releases at SHOT Show in January featured the silver slide. Both models have been very popular, but there were still those that didn't really want the silver slide. Glock responded with release of the G43X and G48 now available in the traditional black finish. Both options are shipping now and are available in our Pro Shop.





BUG Guns!

The Back Up Gun or BUG gun has been part of the firearm nomenclature for years. The original purpose of a BUG gun was to be a secondary (or back up) option to your primary firearm. Increasingly, BUG guns are being used not only as a second carry gun, but as an additional option for seasonal changes, deep concealment needs for just for comfort. For me a BUG gun is not a second gun I carry on me for a backup, but an option I can use when a larger gun is less desirable. For example, I use my BUG gun when I am working in the yard, at the gym or when traditional IWB or OWB holster is not an option. So let's take a look at some of the best options for BUG Guns.

For simplicity sake we will focus on guns that meet the IDPA's BUG Gun Division restrictions and only those chambered in 380ACP and 38Spl.

Per IDPA, handguns permitted for use in matches as BUG include Semi Autos chambered in .380 ACP or larger, have a barrel length of 3 1/2" or less and weigh 26 oz. or less. BUG Revolvers must use .38 or larger cartridges, have a barrel length of 2 1/2" or less weight 26 oz. or less. Both options must fit inside the IDPA size restrictions of 6 1/2" long, 4 5/8" tall and 1 3/8" wide.

The Pistols

By last count there are least 20 different manufactures offering pistols chambered in 380ACP. They include pocket sized pistols, medium sized pistols, hammer fired, single action and striker fired pistols of varying sizes. However, we are choosing to focus on pocket size pistols from the major manufacturers.

 Low cost leaders Kel Tec and Taurus were а few of the first pocket pistols to be offered for under \$300.00. They were small, snappy, had really bad triggers, were not very fun to shoot, and the reliability was hit or miss. But if you wanted а no frills pocket gun for very few bills,

they were the goto options. Ruger LCP -In 2008 Ruger jumped into pocket pistol game with the introduction of the LCP. lt was still а no frills gun that was hard to shoot, but with the backing of а major name brand like Ruger, the market for these little guns

exploded. In 2016 Ruger released the LCPII. The improvements included а much better trigger, а wider backstrap (for less felt recoil) and а slide that locks back after the last round is fired. Ruger also dropped the **MSRP** of the original LCP and the LCPII by \$100.00. Both models can be found

for under \$300.00 and are currently "the most bang for the buck" for BUG Gun pistols. ■ S&W Bodyguard 380 -In 2011, Smith entered into the pocket pistol market with the release of the Bodyguard 380. lt was the first attempt to put big pistol features into а small package. They

offered models with and without safeties, had options for integrated lasers and even drift adjustable sights. However, all these features resulted in an **MSRP** at or above the \$400 mark, and they still had terrible triggers. Glock 42 _ Glock shocked the industry in 2014 when it introduced а single stack

pocket pistol in 380ACP. lt looked, felt and shot like all the other Glocks. The only downside was that it was а larger, heavier than others, This made it а little harder to conceal in а pocket Additionally, the MSRP was pushing \$500.00. However, there is no doubt that the Glock 42

is the most "shootable" pocket pistol on the market

The Revolvers

While there are dozens of manufacturers producing Semi-Auto BUG guns, there are only a handful of Revolver BUG options. Here are the top contenders.

Taurus 856 Ultra Light series. These revolvers retail for under \$375.00. They comes in а variety of color options and have а capacity of 6 rounds, something not found on most of the other models. However, with

extra capacity, comes extra weight and they are the heaviest option at at 16 ounces. Charter Arms Undercover light. These aluminium framed 5 shot revolvers weight in at only 12 ounces and come in а variety of colors. With an **MSRP** of about \$420.00 they are а lightweight option that is

not only easy to carry, but easy on the pocketbook. Smith & Wesson 442 or 642 Ultralight. These 5 shot 15 ounce revolvers are some of the most popular options available. With an MSRP of \$469.00, they are а little more expensive than the Taurus or Charter Arms, but they have

long track record of reliability and have а much larger selection of aftermarket accessories, such as holsters, grips and laser options. Ruger LCR _ With an MSRP of \$579.00, it is the most expensive option in this list. The LCR combines an aluminium frame and а polymer fire control housing to

make it both lightweight (13.5 ounces) and softer shooting. This design, combined with excellent trigger and Hogue grips, makes the LCR the easiest and most enjoyable snubnosed revolver to shoot.

If I had to go with one, it would be the Ruger LCPII. It is priced well below the Glock 42 and the trigger is almost as good. In addition, the LCPII is smaller and lighter, and even in a holster (which is a must have) it will still slip nicely into a pocket.

For a revolver I would go with the Ruger LCR. While the LCR is much more expensive, the trigger is so much better then the other options. While S&W does make some Performance Center options with really good triggers, the additional cost will run you about the same price as the Ruger. If the additional cost of the Ruger is an obstacle, then the Smith 442 or 642 will server you just as well.
